## **SCRIPTURE - Chad**

Acts 1:1-14

In the first book, Theophilus, I wrote about all that Jesus did and taught from the beginning <sup>2</sup>until the day when he was taken up to heaven, after giving instructions through the Holy Spirit to the apostles whom he had chosen. <sup>3</sup>After his suffering he presented himself alive to them by many convincing proofs, appearing to them over the

course of forty days and speaking about the kingdom of God. 4While staying with them, he ordered them not to leave Jerusalem, but to wait there for the promise of the Father. 'This', he said, 'is what you have heard from me; 5 for John baptized with water, but you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit not many days from now.' 6 So when they had come together, they asked him, 'Lord, is this the time when you will restore the kingdom to Israel?' 7He replied, 'It is not for you to know the times or periods that the Father has set by his own authority. <sup>8</sup>But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth.' When he had said this, as they were watching, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight. <sup>10</sup>While he was going and they were gazing up towards heaven, suddenly two men in white robes stood by them. <sup>11</sup>They said, 'People of Galilee, why do you stand looking up towards heaven? This Jesus, who has been taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven.' 12 Then they returned to Jerusalem from the mount called Olivet, which is near Jerusalem, a sabbath day's journey away. <sup>13</sup>When they had entered the city, they went to the room upstairs where they were staying, Peter, and John, and James, and Andrew, Philip and Thomas, Bartholomew and Matthew, James son of Alphaeus, and Simon the Zealot, and Judas son of James. <sup>14</sup>All these were constantly devoting themselves to prayer, together with certain women, including Mary the mother of Jesus, as well as his brothers.

# SERMON - Rev. Chad Delaney 40-Plus Days

As a youth minister and junior high youth leader over the years I have all sorts of ongoing gags or silly things I do with the kids...many of which are super-corny.

One of my favorites though is when new kids or young ones in the group will come to a meeting and start asking, "What are we going to do tonight?" It is the junior high version of "Are we there yet? Are we there yet?" They are not interested in sitting around. Let's play a game. Run around the church. Go outside! Something to be active! So I greet all that energy with..."Well tonight we are going to all sit down and start with 45 minutes of deep, meditative, silent prayer." And they just don't know how to take it. "Is he messing with me?" Of course, I am. For them...Opening & Closing Prayer, fine. 45 min of silent prayer? Not so much. Sitting around and Intensive tending to the inner spiritual life" is not high on the priority list.

This Sunday we are beginning the Book of Acts as we get an inside look at those foundational days after Jesus was raised from the dead. Easter begins a season of 50 days until the day of Pentecost when the Holy Spirit is poured out on the church. When that day comes there will be a flurry of activity--preaching, healing, teaching, ministry in Jesus name! Disciples set loose on the world. But until Pentecost....what happened in the meantime? What did they do with those 50 days? Honestly I didn't pay much attention to that before...but there is some stuff for us to learn there.

For 40 of those days, the bible says they were meeting with and listening to the Risen Christ. Jesus was appearing to folks and speaking to them about the Kingdom of God

Now...this 40-day number should ring some bells for us. The number 40 shows up in the Bible a lot. The flood rains came for 40 days and 40 nights...the Israelites wandered the desert for 40 years....Moses was on Mt. Sinai getting the commandments for 40 days....Jesus fasted in the desert for 40 days before beginning his ministry. Ok, Bible authors we get it. "40" is used over and over again in the bible not to report historical detail, but to symbolize a period of wilderness, wandering, waiting, testing, and listening in the person or people's life.

So for these 40 days they had been listening to the Risen Christ teach them about the Kingdom of God, but then Jesus tells them...it's going to be even longer. He tells them they aren't to go forth until the power of the Holy Spirit descends on them calling them to be witnesses from Jerusalem to Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth. Until then, though stay put. In those moments, Jesus is whisked away into the heavens right before their eyes. They are left alone...to wait. What do they do with that time?

Here we are on the 29th day from Governor DeWine's stay-at-home order and I'm kinda wondering the same thing. At first it felt like a little vacation from the world, but the realities of what is happening and the effects of the virus have really taken its toll

on us emotionally, physically, economically, spiritually. What do **we** do with our time as we wait for the world to open up again?

All of us are handling this time differently. For many of us, we are still just as active or moreso. There are many essential personnel and public servants are putting in even more hours than usual and even putting their lives at risk for all of us. Our deepest gratitude to all of you. Thank you.

So some of us feel a little sheepish about actually loving this time. Less obligations to the outside world. Working from home. Connecting to loved ones or having more alone time.

And many of us are struggling with this holding pattern. Told we can't leave our homes but for essentials. We've put a pause on our social lives. Our shopping trips. Our family gatherings. Our game nights. Our church services. Our volunteer opportunities. And it's wearing on us.

However you are dealing with this time...the question still emerges...what do we do with this time?

- Obviously, we can fill it with fluffy stuff which can be a great escape. Phone or computer games. Binge watching a show you've been wanting to watch.
- We can also be active and busy! Is there a room or closet I can clean? Work in the yard? Paint the spare room? Organize the bookshelf again. All ways to be productive.

All of those things can be good. We all need to deal and cope with things in the ways that help us the most. All of us are different.

But in reading the passage this week, I was pushed by what the disciples did. Told by Jesus to wait, they returned to Jerusalem and all the women and men that followed Jesus quote, "constantly devoted themselves to prayer."

Now---listen---I don't think they were literally praying 24 hours a day until Pentecost came, but we get the picture. That 40+ days of wilderness and waiting time they had...they were intentional about nurturing their life with God. They tended to the inner workings of their soul. They sought to connect with their Creator. They used that time to prepare their hearts, minds, and souls for the day when they would be set loose on the world.

What we might recognize is that...as it turns out...sometimes even adults forget to take time to nurture their inner spiritual life. We will find ways to stay busy, productive, distract or escape....but in these strange days. In our own 40-day+ time--Wilderness. Wandering. Waiting. Testing. And Listening. So what will we do with this time?

Psalm 90:12 says, "12 So teach us, Lord, to count our days that we may gain a wise heart."

Will we only just pass the time...or how can we make these days count?

People of God, we are a people of action! We will continue to find ways even in this time to reach out with loving kindness to help our neighbors and strangers. We will stay busy working and playing, filling our time with productivity and leisure.

But in these days, let's set aside some time for prayer and devotion. To grow in God's Wisdom and Spirit. To deepen our foundation in the grace of Jesus Christ. At some point (hopefully sooner rather than later) will be released back into the world. What will be different for us? How will we have nurtured that something within us which will reflect the heart of God? That we might be more prepared in Body and Spirit to be who God created us to be and to share the Good News of the Risen Christ here in our own Jerusalem, Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth! May it be so. Amen.
